Biology students have begun the year by examining what it means to be sustainable based on the three pillars; economy, society, and environment. In this first, short unit, the students analyze various real world scenarios to determine sustainability challenges and to then develop potential solutions to those challenges.

Physical science students are working through the first unit of the year which delves deeply into skills necessary for scientific literacy and numeracy. We began by designing systems of measurement to better understand the metric and US sys-

tems. We are now creating games to teach others how to convert between units of the metrics system.

Genetics students are in the thralls of learning the intricate history of the discovery of the DNA molecule, its structure, and component parts. This foundational understanding of DNA structure and how it applies to genes, in addition to a first project on chromosome 4 mutations, will help students realize the significance of the study of genetics.

10th grade students are already beginning to prepare for the upcoming CAPT in March of



2016. Students have taken their initial baseline assessments and should be well aware of their current level within the next week or so. Student shave also been given assignments on studyisland.com to help them practice. Look for a letter home soon related to additional CAPT preparation strategies and opportunities!






